### 2022 Ag Census Deadline

June 30, 2022 is the last day to sign up for the 2022 Ag Census. If you have never received a census and are new to NASS surveys, sign up to be counted today. You do not need to sign up if you already receive NASS surveys. Key Dates:

- June 30, 2022 sign up ends
- November 2022 ag census mails out and data collection begins
- February 6, 2023 response deadline
- 2024 (TBD) data release

The Census of Agriculture is a complete count of U.S. farms and ranches and the people who operate them. Even small plots of land - whether rural or urban - growing fruit, vegetables or some food animals count if \$1,000 or more of such products were raised and sold, or normally would have been sold, during the Census year. The Census of Agriculture, taken only once every five years, looks at land use and ownership, operator characteristics, production practices, income and expenditures. For America's farmers and ranchers, the Census of Agriculture is their voice, their future, and their opportunity.

### **COST-SHARE UPDATE**

During the cost-share year that ends June 30, 2022, the Dickinson County Conservation District allocated \$31,625 in cost-share funds to county landowners. Fifteen landowners were approved for Water Resources projects, including 8 acres of grassed waterways and 12,586 feet of gradient terraces. Five landowners were approved for Non-Point Source Pollution Control projects including four failed septic system replacements and two abandoned well pluggings.

Dickinson County Conservation District is one of 105 conservation districts across Kansas, organized along county borders. Conservation districts work in partnership with other agencies and organizations to coordinate technical, financial, and educational resources to promote conservation practices and technologies and to assist people with properly managing natural resources.

## Did you know?

During the Dust Bowl, farmers lost more than 480 tons of soil per acre.

In 2021, all conservation practices implemented in Dickinson County resulted in an estimated 485 tons of soil saved.

### **KACD Applauds Increased Conservation Investment**

The fiscal year (FY) 2022 omnibus appropriations package, which includes considerable increases to conservation investment, was signed into law Friday by President Biden. The National Association of Conservation Districts (NACD) applauds both the U.S. House of Representatives and the U.S. Senate, as well as President Biden, for recognizing the importance of conservation and environmental protection programs and is pleased to see the package includes increased funding for these crucial programs.

"Effective conservation begins at the grassroots level, putting boots on the ground in local communities to advance locally-led conservation efforts where they're needed most," said NACD President Michael Crowder. "This spending package is a testament to the importance of collaborative conservation at the federal, state, and local levels, and solidifies the dedication NACD and its partners have toward advancing that mission."

These investments include \$904 million for Conservation Operations at the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA), a \$72 million increase over FY21. This vital account funds conservation technical assistance, which is pivotal in

getting conservation assistance on the ground at the local level. Additionally, increased funding for the State and Private Forestry Program, Forest Stewardship Program, and EPA's 319 Nonpoint Source Management Program, are bright spots in the package that will help producers address natural resource concerns on their lands and protect the environment.

"The nation's nearly 3,000 diverse conservation districts and their local communities will no doubt benefit from the increased investment to conservation and environmental programs included in this spending package," said NACD CEO Jeremy Peters. "NACD will continue to do its part to advocate for the advancement of conservation on all landscapes."

Equally important, NACD is pleased to see the omnibus bill does not include any reductions to critical Farm Bill conservation programs. That funding is needed to meet the unprecedented demand from farmers and ranchers to address natural resource concerns. As Farm Bill negotiations begin, NACD will continue to play a leading role in shaping federal policy and maintaining its strong voice for advancing voluntary, locally-led, incentive-based conservation.
